About the Atlantic String Quartet

The award winning Atlantic String Quartet is comprised of the principal string players of the Newfoundland Symphony Orchestra. The current members of the quartet are Heather Kao and Nancy Case-Oates – violins and Kate Read – viola. Vernon Regehr has joined the quartet as cellist while the NSO undertakes a search for a new principal cellist. Hailing from Newfoundland and Labrador, the UK and the US, they bring rich and diverse experience.

The ASQ is an integral part of the creative life of the St. John's community and is known for its versatility and ability to work with music and musicians from all styles and genres.

Going from strength to strength they released their first CD in 2020, of the Ravel and Bliss String Quartets, produced by Mark Fewer, for which they won the MusicNL Classical Artist of the Year, 2021.

In addition to leading their sections in the ever-blossoming NSO, the quartet presents their own Recital Series. The ASQ programmes a rich and diverse selection of standard and lesser known repertoire, and they are dedicated to performing Canadian works, by composers such as award winning Dinuk Wijeratne, Andrew Staniland and Kellie Marie Murphy. In their 2019-2020 season they presented a programme of music by entirely by female composers (dating from the Middle Ages to the present), and in their 2020-2021 season are continuing to programme music by BIPOC and female composers.

They have shared the stage with such international classical musicians as Charles Richard-Hamelin, Angela Chang, Ofra Harnoy, Shauna Rolston and Mark Fewer, and artists such as Duane Andrews, The Once, Mary Barry and renowned songwriter Ron Hynes.

Equally comfortable with with classical and other genres they have performed Chick Corea's "Lyric Suite" for sextet with the fabulous jazz musicians Bill Brennan and Florian Hoefner. The ASQ has collaborated with Artistic Fraud of Newfoundland, Lady Cove Choir and played in various guises at Sound Symposium in St John's, where in 2018 they performed Raven Chacon's "The Journey of the Horizontal People". They are not afraid to improvise. The ASQ is also regularly in demand as session musicians.

As well as in and around St. John's, the quartet regularly performs around the province, with concerts in Corner Brook, Woody Point, Bonavista's Garrick Theatre, Cupid's Theatre and Eastport, to name a few, and they are regulars at the Cape St Mary's series.

Members of the quartet teach at Memorial University of Newfoundland as well as run their own teaching studios. They coach and conduct young ensembles, and are invited to adjudicate at festivals.

Program Notes

String Quartet No. 2 - Peter Gardner (2021)

Movement 1: Allegro agitato - Tranquillo - Allegro agitato

The quartet opens with a short, abrupt motif which quickly turns into an accompaniment of competing cross rhythms working beneath a high languid theme presented by the first violin. This theme is subsequently passed to the second violin in a lower octave. Ultimately the theme mutates into a canon passed between all four voices causing the movement to appear to slow down before the opening idea returns with a bang. A mutated form of recapitulation leads through a gentle transition to a four-part, chorale-like section before the opening motif leads us to a second recapitulation and a subito prestissimo coda derived from the opening idea.

Movement 2: Largo tranquillo - Pui mosso - Largo Tranquillo

Mvt.2 begins in a placid, chorale-like manner above a six-bar ground bass in the cello. The inner voices mutate into a gentle, syncopated rocking motion which supports a languidly flowing theme in the first violin. This theme morphs into a piu mosso in which a walking pizzicato bass line supports what is eventually a three-part canon in the upper three voices. A return to the opening tempo with the last six measures of the movement being the first six in retrograde.

Movement 3: Minuet & trio

Cast in a typical minuet and trio A-8-A form but as a rather comical lopsided waltz with a short tranquil B section. After the B section the return to the A section heralds a brisk coda where players trip over each other in a headlong rush for the exit.

Movement 4: Vivace - moto perpetuo

The final movement opens in an abrupt agitated manner reminiscent of the opening of the first movement. This is immediately followed by fast-flowing canonic entries as the movement takes off as a moto-perpetuo. The moto-perpetuo is brought to an abrupt halt before an 11 measure calm. Following this short interlude the moto-perpetuo runs to the end of the movement. In the final moments of the movement rhythmic elements from the third movement are bandied about as sixteenth notes career from one section to the other.
